

Here's a Good Seat for You

Deep End Faith | May 15, 2022 | James 2:1-13 Mike Foster

Don't show favoritism!

The word translated “favoritism” or “partiality” literally means “receiving the face.”

Favoritism is a “self-serving discrimination based on shallow externals” – Ligon Duncan

Three failures of favoritism

- It believes something different than Jesus (vv. 1-4)

- It breaks the heart of God (vv. 5-7)

- It breaks the law of God (vv. 8-13)

GROUP DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. What stood out to you most from the message?
2. Read 1 Samuel 16:6-7, Acts 10:34-35, and Colossians 3:9-11. What do we learn in these verses about the way God sees people?
3. Why do you think it's hard sometimes for people to feel like they belong in a church? Have you ever felt like you don't fit? Explain.
4. Share about a time when you were made to feel welcome in an uncomfortable situation. What difference did this make for you? Has this ever happened for you in a church or ministry setting?
5. Read Matthew 22:16. According to this verse, why was it so hard for the religious leaders to trap Jesus? Can you think of examples in Jesus' ministry when He proved to be no respecter of persons?
6. Read Matthew 22:16 again. Imagine how encouraging it might be to have someone say this about you? In what areas might you need to grow in order for this to be true of you?
7. Describe a time when you were tempted to show favoritism or partiality of some kind? How did you succeed or fail? What did God teach you through that experience?
8. Imagine being a church and receiving this letter from James. What kinds of things might that church need to do in order to make sure the situation in verses 2-4 does not occur?
9. What kind of things might our church need to do in order to protect against favoritism and to help people “find their fit” in our body? Is there something the Lord would lead you to do to help?
10. What would it look like next Sunday for you to say “Here's a good seat for you” to someone? Be specific.
