IT STARTED WITH A PRAYER

THERE WAS A MAN SENT FROM GOD TO START A WORK OF FAITH IN WASHINGTON, D.C. HIS NAME WAS DR. CLARK FORCEY.

Dr. Forcey's longtime friend, Mary Ernest, related that she heard him describe the events of a day in the early 1930's, when he was driving through Northwest D.C. on his way home to Ohio after a trip. His car stalled directly in front of a house. In spite of his attempts he could not restart the engine. He walked to the front door of the house and was greeted by the owner, who kindly invited him in to use her phone. As they talked, Dr. Forcey mentioned that he was a pastor. With great excitement, she said, "God has brought you. I have prayed that God would send a pastor to us!"

Dr. Forcey went back home to the flourishing church where he was serving (in Ohio). He had been ready to settle down there with their five children. But God had other plans. He felt called of God to come back to Washington, D.C. and serve as a pastor.

Dr. Forcey was born in Bigler, PA. in 1901. At age nine, he and his father attended a revival meeting, where he accepted Christ as his Savior. The newspapers called him "The Boy Preacher" as he held evangelistic services in churches. As a sophomore at Greenville College in Greenville, IL, he was ordained. He married Margaret, whose parents were missionaries in Haiti.

Dr. Forcey's prayer as he arrived In Washington, D.C. in April, 1933, was, "Lord, send me souls!" His wife and children (Lillian, Eldon, Leslie, Clark and Herschell-an infant) arrived in June at the end of the school year. They stayed for a while with the dear woman who had prayed for him to come.

Dr. Forcey first opened a radio ministry on station WOL with services on Sundays and some weekdays. Mrs. Forcey was the soloist. He held evangelistic services in the Vermont Avenue Social Hall of the National City Christian Church.

THE SPEED OF COFFEE

"It's time for coffee!" Charlin said again. We had just finished lunch. And before that, we had coffee. But we were about to have coffee again. And the next day, we would have coffee four or five more times. It's what you do in Honduras. And it's not stopping at Starbucks and grabbing something to "get yourself going" on your way to work. This isn't coffee to "start you up" but to "slow you down." This coffee isn't for caffeine but for connection. It's all about relationships.

My friend Charlin has served as a pastor and church planter in Honduras since 2020. Prior to that, he interned for five years at my former church. In May, I was blessed to visit with Charlin for a few days on my way to El Salvador, where I officiated a wedding for a dear Forcey family. In Honduras, I enjoyed teaching a marriage conference and preaching in the church, but some of my favorite ministry happened in the conversations over coffee.

I've been saying that ministry in Honduras happens "at the speed of coffee." Coffee takes time to brew. And it's supposed to take time to drink. It's too hot (and bitter!) to chug quickly. You're supposed to hold it, smell it, sip it, and savor it – ideally while sitting with others who are doing the same. And this is what you do in Honduras. And I've done the same in Ethiopia, Costa Rica, and other nations. And my experience in such places is that slowing down, resting well, and relating more deeply with people leads to better ministry, not less!



I'm not sure how much coffee Jesus drank, but I

know he took time to relate with people. Jesus was known for a lot of things – his miracles, his teaching, his conflicts with religious leaders – but I don't think he was known for being in a hurry. Despite having just three years to fulfill his mission, he never seems rushed. He affirmed those who took time to be with him even when they came across to others as entirely unproductive (Luke 10:41-42). He always had time for interruptions (Matthew 9:20-22). At times he moved too slowly to meet expectations (John 11:17-22). He constantly withdrew from the world to relate with his Father in a solitary place (Mark 1:35, 2:13). And he invited his disciples, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest" (Mark 6:31). In fact, his offer of salvation could be framed as an invitation to rest (Matthew 11:28-30).

There is no shortcut to ministry – it takes relationships. And there is no shortcut to relationships – they take time. I don't like when people think I'm in a hurry. What would have to change for us to move at the speed of coffee? Is there a way you can slow down this summer or make some permanent adjustments to your pace of life? I know it seems impossible. But what if it's impossible to continue at your current pace in any kind of healthy way for long? Maybe it starts with taking time to pray and talk with Jesus about it.

To be honest, though I love sipping good coffee in other countries, I rarely drink coffee in America. I've never liked it enough to justify getting myself hooked on it. But no matter our beverage of choice, we need the kinds of relationships with Jesus and each other that take time to brew, sip, and savor.

Forcey Builds Relationships

We are thankful for the Forcey community both school and church. My wife (Monifa) and I have been embraced and welcomed. In this fast-paced world, it's easy to get caught up in our own little bubbles, but I truly believe that fostering connections has brought a special kind of richness and joy to our lives.

Let me share a heartfelt story that exemplifies the power of the Forcey family and its community building power. In April 2020, my wife was on temporary assignment to Maryland for 6 months on military orders, with the hopes of returning to Georgia. However, six months turned into 18 months because of extensions of her orders. Instead of just visiting Maryland several times a month, my wife and I decided that I would look for work and we wondered if God had plans for us in Maryland. Shortly after this question my wife came across the Forcey job listing and we went for it. I interviewed, got the job. So we decided to relocate to Maryland.



We are not new to moving. We've moved about 8 times in 30 years, three of those moves took our family overseas. We knew nothing about Forcey and knew no one at Forcey. From the first day we met the Forcey family, we have experienced nothing but kindness and genuine care. We've never felt isolated or have experienced the longing for a sense of belonging. The Forcey School and Forcey Bible Church have welcomed us with open hearts, hands, and arms. For that we are thankful.

I know our story of love and kindness is not the only one. Many people that I have spoken with have felt the same warmth and kindness as they've walked through the Forcey doors.

Building a community isn't just about finding people with similar interests; it's about creating a support system that uplifts and inspires. It's about being there for one another through the highs and lows, celebrating victories, and offering a shoulder to lean on during tough times. The Forcey family, for us, has been all of this and more.



So, if you are new to the Forcey family, I encourage you to take a leap of faith, embrace the hearts that have reached out, actively seek opportunities to build community and nurture relationships. Forcey has been a light for our Christian faith and a delightful place to build genuine relationships that prosper body, soul, and spirit.

Forcey, thank you, you never know the incredible connections and friendships that may blossom from your culture of open hearts, open hands, and open arms.

Remember Forcey Bible Church and Forcey Christian school, building a community starts with us. Continue to be genuinely open, kind, and ready to fully embrace each and every person who knocks on your doors.





A WORD FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Another successful school year has come to a close. June 14, 2023, was the last day of the 2022-2023 school year. Forcey Christian School finished the year with 383 students and 47 of them were graduating 8th graders who made up the class of 2023. We thank God for his mercy, grace, and provision this year. FCS was able to raise just under \$70,000 in our Forcey Forward annual fund. Allocation of funds is already being put to good use with summer building painting projects, new student furniture for middle school and second grade, and a



totally upgraded teacher workroom space. The upgraded workroom space will allow for better flow and efficiency in the workroom.

After a short time of rest and rejuvenation, we will once again gear up for another school year. The FCS School Board updated our Vision and Mission statements this past year. We will begin the 2023-2024 school year focused on achieving our mission. One way we will focus our energies is through our newly completed Forcey Christian School Strategic Plan. It will be launched this fall. The strategic plan was created collaboratively with input from all stakeholders. We are excited to share it and get started with school improvement measures.

<u>The FCS Vision:</u> To train-up future generations of servant-leaders, who impact their world spiritually, intellectually, and socially, while leading lives that bring glory to Jesus Christ.

Soon he began looking for land. He was still living on his own personal finances. He prayed over and claimed for God the property at Piney Branch Road and Underwood in Washington, DC. A widow lent Dr. Forcey \$300. to buy a tent, but later she demanded to have the money back. The owner of the property would not sell it but was convinced to rent it. As Dr. Forcey stood on the land with the tent, the next miracle from God happened. Three men from the neighborhood volunteered to help. One of the men was Elder Solomon Michaux, a pastor and radio minister. After they finished putting up the tent, they would not accept any pay. But they requested to have a watermelon feast as their reward.



The tent had a sawdust floor with pews of wooden planks. In the summers it was burning hot, and it had no heat in the winter. It held 300. Within 4 or 5 weeks the place was full, and funds were coming in. Mrs. Forcey said that the attendance for the first service was 301 and the next was 499. Severe winds blew the tent down in July. Several men were able to set it back up immediately. God was with these followers of Christ in the midst of hard times. A second tent was erected the second year, but it also was demolished after a storm. The congregation nobly attended open-air services wearing overcoats. Dr. Forcey preached the simple gospel message – that Jesus died to pay for our sin, and people need to accept Jesus as their Savior. Little by little people began to respond. Next they met at National Christian Church and then Joppa Hall on Georgia Avenue in the winter.

After many difficulties, and with God's help, a tabernacle was erected with practically no funds available. On October 14, 1934, the large tabernacle on the Piney Branch property was dedicated. A three-day a week radio ministry was launched with four preaching services a week held in the tabernacle, later (1946) called The Non-Sectarian Tabernacle. The attendance soon became 1,000.

Dr. Forcey had worked among the churches of the Methodist, Episcopal, Free Methodist, Nazarene and Baptist churches. Therefore he had a background suitable to non-sectarian and interdenominational work. He felt that although Christians may differ in regard to detail and methods, there should be a Gospel mission and tabernacles where they could worship and agree on the fundamentals of the Christian faith.

Prayer was considered the foundation of the church, and prayer services were held before each meeting of the church. By the end of his pastorate, Dr. Forcey had written 7 books and delivered 1169 radio addresses and 3901 sermons plus made about 1800 pastoral calls. One tenth of their funds were designated for missions. There was no salary, but a love offering was taken once a month.

Dr. Forcey died November 25, 1940 at the age of 39. Many church members came to his home in those last days. There were so many that some gathered outside the window of his bedroom and prayed.

Journals from my missions trip to the countryside of Ecuador

"...so is my Word that goes out from my mouth; It will not return to me empty, but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." (Isaiah 55:11).

DAY 1

I left SS to NY where I had to another fly to Miami, my flight to Miami was kind of late, and because of that I almost missed my connection to Quito the capital of Ecuador, I was the last person to board the plane. I arrived in Quito around 10:30pm



On this day I picked up the Bibles that I had to bring with me on the mission trip and left Quito on the very last bus of the day (11:30pm). This bus brought me near my destination.





DAY 4

Together with my cousin we went, by bus, to a small village called "San Isidro," 45 minutes away from "Ricaurte." In this village, there is a small Church called "Santa Palabra" (Holy Word) and we chose this place as our Base Site from where we were supposed to walk to the mountains. In this village we spent a little time sharing the Gospel with some people, before going to the mountains. In my walking I stopped in several homes to share the Gospel. In one of those houses I visited, a person who threatened me with a machete, but I asked him to please calm down and listen to me first, so I was able to identify myself as a missionary who was sharing the Gospel of Jesus; then he calmed down and after apologizing to me I was able to talk to him about the Lord Jesus and he ended up by asking me for a Bible, so I gave one to him. After this, I continue my walking up to the mountains and around 6:00pm, I arrived to a home were I had planned to spent the night; But, on my arriving to that home. I was welcomed by seven wild dogs that attacked me. and when I tried to defend myself, they circled me and pushed me into a ravine; but somebody came to my rescue and delivered me from the dogs' attack. I spent the night there and shared the Gospel with them and left a Bible with them.

DAY 3

I arrived, around 5:00am, to the point where my cousin was waiting for me and together, we went to his home in a nearby town called "Ricaurte". I brought with me 3 boxes of Bibles and Tracts to be handed to people on our walk to the villages and the mountains. I spent the whole day in "Ricaurte" and together with my cousin went to some houses sharing the Gospel and handing some tracts to people we met. At the end of the day one person made the decision to accept the Lord. We finished the day around 8:30pm



I came back to the Base Site, from the mountain I went to the day before, picked up some Bibles and some more tracts and went to another small village called "La Polvareda." In this village, together with my cousin, we went house by house talking with some people about the Gospel and handing them some tracts. We were also told that in one of those houses was living alone one old woman that was

very ill, so we went to that house and shared the Gospel with this person, and she made the decision to accept the Lord

Jesus in her heart. By the end of the day, I met a group of teenagers and spoke to them about Sesus (they were about 15). They paid very close attention to all the words I spoke; I told them about God's love for everybody and the need of receiving Jesus in their hearts. I also mentioned that heaven and hell are real, they also asked many questions. At the end I challenged them of making the decision of accepting Jesus in their heart, but they mentioned they were not ready yet. I came back to the base site around 8:30pm.





DAY8

In my daily walking I was unable to bring many Bibles with me, but I asked people who wanted a Bible to come by over the Base Site to receive one. So, in this day, many people came by to the Base Site looking for Bibles, I gave to them, and mentioned that the Bible is for reading and learning from it in a "daily basis". In each Bible that I handed to each person, I wrote their names and a small portion from the Bible. After doing this, I walked to another small village called "La Pompeya" and doing the same thing I had been doing every day, sharing the Gospel with people that were open to hear.



DAY 9

The Brothers from the church "Santa Palabra" in "San Isidro" asked me to stay for the "Vigil" they were having the following night, but I told them that I couldn't stay because I had to go back to Quito next day. So, I left the Base Site to "Ricaurte", but not before the Brothers gave thanks to the good Lord and prayed

DAY 10

I went back to Quito with the satisfaction of having fulfilled the mission I was sent by the Lord

NEW LIFE


-a testimony by Brandon Young
